



Successes and Challenges

Successes

- Attracted some high profile authors, increased international authorship
- Can publish papers with a timely turn-around
- A place to publish "secondary outcomes" papers from larger studies and/or discussion pieces "state of the science"
- Some service user authored papers
- All papers are double blind peer reviewed

Challenges

- Copy flow; niche area, specific remit of some aspect of mental health AND co-existing substance misuse must be the focus of the paper
- We attract papers from practitioners, not experienced at writing for publication and some papers undergo several major revisions
- Still UK focused, aim to increase international content and readership
- Lack of impact factor
